She joined the U.S. Army. In 1945 and this was difficult for her parents because it meant that all three of their children were in the service at war time.


Further Education

MEMORABLE EXPERIENCES:

While stationed in Italy, I was able to get a "compassionate leave" to visit my great uncle in Sweden. He was the only one of 7 brothers who did not immigrate to the US. None of the family had been able to return to see their brother. I was the only relative from America to visit him. We were required to travel in uniform and he was so proud that his grand niece was an officer. He paraded me to the homes of all his friends. I didn't speak Swedish and he didn't speak English, so this was very confusing until we found a neighbor who could interpret for us. It was a wonderful, rewarding experience which I will treasure always. Another memorable experience occurred because I remained in the reserves after discharge from WWII. Because of my operating room post graduate course and experience, I was recalled for the Korean War. I was recalled at the same rank I was discharged, namely 1Lt. At that time, the Army recruited new nurses with BS degrees at the rank of Captain, but refused to do the same for those of us who had served in WWII both here and overseas. I was assigned to Fitzsimmons Army Hospital and decided to make the most of my time so I attended graduate school at the University of Colorado while working 44 hours a week. In an effort to encourage Regular Army Nurses to get their BS degrees, the Army paid their tuition for courses taken, but refused to pay for my graduate degree tuition.
