of Nursing in 1998. She continued her education to become a Nurse Practitioner. Dr. Cooling has a comprehensive research background and has received grant funding for the OSF System over the years. Her work has been presented nationally and internationally.

We have exciting plans to bring in the fall 2025 semester. First of all, I am happy to report that we welcomed Dr. Mary McNamara as our Provost at both colleges in August. Dr. McNamara comes to us from Loyola University and brings her skills in curriculum development and faculty practice models to the college of nursing. Dr. McNamara has a vision and a plan to assist me with maintaining a high-quality nursing education program that meets the healthcare needs of the communi-

ties our graduates will serve in.

We started offering the LPN-BSN program this fall. There are currently over 200 LPNs working within the OSF Healthcare System. The OSF funding program is a wonderful opportunity for these working nurses to enhance their education, thereby increasing the number of registered nurses with a BSN.



The partnership with Monmouth is looking very positive as 24 freshmen were admitted with an end goal of taking the Saint Francis Accelerated program in their final year of study in Fall 2028. The teaching Nursing Home Project will begin in January through a partnership with a local nursing home to allow junior students the opportunity to learn how to care for older adults. Those students will learn key measures of quality and safety including fall prevention, prevention of skin breakdown, medication management, and caring for persons with dementia.

There are many activities planned to celebrate the 120th year of the college of nursing. On Friday, October 3rd we will celebrate our Distinguished Alumni, Dr. Melinda Cooling, along with four other individuals who will be recognized for their contribution to nursing. On Saturday October 4th we will celebrate with the traditional brunch, view school uniforms over the years, enjoy presentations from our four awardees, and participate in the silent auction.

A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE IN NURSING EDUCATION SINCE 1905



The Illinois Valley Nurse Honor Guard (IVNHG) had the privilege to complete the Nightingale Tribute on September 10th for Marcella McCann. Four of the members participating had Mrs. McCann as one of their nursing instructors. There are currently 59 members of the IVNHG, of which 10 are St. Francis Hospital School of Nursing / College of Nursing Alumni.

Marcy McCann was a member of the faculty at the School of Nursing and later the College of Nursing for many years up until her retirement. She was a devoted teacher who inspired new generations of healthcare professionals. She frequently remarked that she loved the "brand new student" so she could teach them "the basics" first which started with listening. Marcy's students remember

her not only as a gifted teacher but as a mentor who guided them with patience, wisdom and heart. It was a special moment to witness the IVNHG pay tribute to Marcy and her years of love and service.

The Nurse Honor Guard is a group of volunteer nurses who pay respect to a fellow nurse who has died. The Nightingale Tribute is like a military tribute. It is steeped in symbolism, including the regalia worn, the nurses cap and cape. The Nightingale lamp and a white rose symbolizing the dedication to the nursing profession is presented to the family. A final Call for Duty is performed during the brief solemn ceremony, officially ending the earthly duty of that nurse. Depending on family wishes and funeral accommodations, this recognition is done at the end of the visitation period or prior to funeral service. Living tributes can also be performed for nurses nearing the end of life.

Membership is open to any nurse retired or working. National and State Chapters require the wearing of prescribed regalia (white uniform, cap and cape for women; navy pants, white shirt and stole for men). Regalia is acquired through IVNHG. You de-

termine the frequency of your participation. Active membership only requires participation in at least one tribute/event per year and attendance at one business meeting. In November 2024, a group of Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) students, faculty, and administrators embarked on a journey to the Dominican Republic to both learn from and serve another culture. Over the course of four days, the team established and operated medical clinics in four different villages, providing primary care

services to more than 400 patients.

Students in the Dominican Republic working hard and honing their nursing skills while helping hundreds from newborns to centenarians.

Guided by our mission to serve with the greatest care and love, the team approached each patient encounter not only as a medical appointment but as an opportunity to truly

see, hear, and honor each individual. Whether

it was measuring blood pressure, prescribing medication, or simply holding a hand and offering reassurance, every act of care was infused with compassion and respect.

In addition to the clinics, we conducted home visits, delivering essential medical care to Dominicans and their families in their own living spac-

es. These intimate visits provided students with an invaluable perspective on healthcare delivery in resource-limited settings and reinforced the need for cultural humility. They also reminded us that the heart of nursing extends far beyond walls and borders - it thrives wherever human need exists.

Stepping outside our tight-knit community into a global context deepened our appreciation for both the universality of human needs and the unique challenges faced by communities with limited access to healthcare. It was humbling to realize that while our resources

and surroundings may differ, the language of care, love, and respect is understood everywhere.

The trip was more than a clinical experience - it was a deeply human connection. We re-

turned home with a piece of our heart still in the Dominican Republic, inspired by the resilience, joy, and warmth of the people we met. The bonds formed both within our team and with the communities we served will continue to shape our perspectives as nurses and as human beings.
