EXPANDING RECOGNITION AND STANDARDIZING EXCELLENCE IN FY24

In FY24, we made significant strides in amplifying the visibility of our award winners by introducing a range of new platforms to showcase their achievements. Winners are now highlighted across screensavers, AHCPC portal banners, expanded social media channels, monthly noon calls, physician meetings, weekly newsletters and the Grateful Patient portal, ensuring their recognition is felt throughout the organization.

To ensure consistency in our award process, we standardized nominations, including clear guidelines on how nominations are submitted, what qualifies as a nomination and the overall presentation. Operational leadership was engaged to clarify these processes and encourage more nominations. This standardized approach ensures every nominee receives a consistent, meaningful experience, no matter which medical group they serve.

We also promoted the OSF Grateful Patient business card, a convenient tool for front office staff to distribute to patients, offering an easy way to access grateful patient information. This initiative has been well-received by management and has proven effective in engaging patients and their families.

Looking ahead to FY25, we are excited to expand our grateful patient outreach and explore new, innovative ways to connect with and recognize our Mission Partners.

STRENGTHENING PROFESSIONAL GOVERNANCE AND NURSE ENGAGEMENT

Professional Governance within the OSF Medical Group empowers our frontline nurses to address clinical challenges and exercise professional autonomy. Monthly meetings focus on improving the work environment for nurses, encouraging them to find their voice and integrating shared leadership principles while aligning with the Mission, Vision and Values of OSF.

FY24 marked a significant continuation of our council's journey to becoming meaningful platforms for nursing voices. We challenged our nurses to champion the career ladder, and with their dedication, we exceeded our goals.

Councils established objectives aligned with the clinical excellence plan and began to assert themselves as agents of change. Engagement was a central focus in FY24, addressing previous challenges in participation and leadership, especially in securing volunteers for chair/co-chair positions. We were pleased to see increased involvement, with council chairs saying, "We finally feel our councils are doing something that matters", as their terms ended.

To further engagement, we implemented take-away slides, ensuring that each regional council received consistent information. These slides included key details for each member to share during local huddles, highlighting important updates, frontline feedback and an opportunity for dedicated time with our CNO to bring forward questions and foster bi-directional communication.

Looking ahead to FY25, we anticipate continued progress as our councils advance their work and elevate nurse engagement and leadership.

This year, 32 Medical Group nurses had the opportunity to attend the symposium. Thanks to the efforts of our practice councils in promoting the nomination process, we received 49 nominations. The councils also played a key role in vetting these nominations and selecting the ones to advance to the Ministry level. Additionally, each regional council submitted a Legacy Award nomination, and we were proud to see our first-ever OSF Medical Group Legacy nominee, Tara Probyn, awarded \$2,500 for a charity she passionately supports.


ADVANCED CARE PLANNING (ACP) AWARDS

OSF Pediatrics in Bloomington donated to the Midnight Café warehouse, a warming center for adults needing emergency shelter. The donations filled four trips and two large transfer carts.

Anne Horowitz, OTR/L, from OSF Rehabilitation in Peoria, co-authored an article with Mission Partners from the OSF HealthCare Illinois Neurological Institute!

Abstract

Mirror therapy is a standard technique of rehabilitation for recovering motor and vision abilities of stroke patients, especially in the case of asymmetric limb function. To enhance traditional mirror therapy, robotic mirror therapy (RMT) has been proposed over the past decade, allowing for assisted bimanual coordination of paretic (affected) and contralateral (healthy) limbs. However, state-of-the-art RMT platforms predominantly target mirrored motions of trajectories, largely limited to 2-D motions. In this paper, an RMT platform is proposed, which can facilitate the patient to practice virtual activities of daily living (ADL) and thus enhance their independence. Two similar (but mirrored) 3D virtual environments are created in which the patients operate robots with both their limbs to complete ADL (such as writing and eating) with the assistance of the therapist. The recovery level of the patient is continuously assessed by monitoring the ability to track assigned trajectories. The patient’s robots are programmed to assist the patient in following these trajectories based on this recovery level.



In September, the Bloomington-Normal Activities Committee filled all the Little Free Pantries listed on the Bloomington-Normal Community website and had a wonderful time participating in the Labor Day Parade!

Mission Partners from the College Avenue Family Medicine and Ambulatory Nurse Clinic in Bloomington, Illinois, adopted 38 children through the Baby Fold and Adopt A Child program. They also participated in the Bloomington-Normal Christmas Parade as The Polar Express.

Throughout the year, they donated vanloads of goods to the Midnight Cafe with the Salvation Army, the Neville House Domestic Abuse Center and the YMCA summer kids program.

They also filled all the Little Free Pantries in Bloomington-Normal twice, participated in the Labor Day Parade, gave Valentines to local skilled nursing facility residents, hosted Easter Bunny photos, organized a Trunk or Treat, and refilled the Little Library of Books at OSF Pediatrics in Bloomington.



OSF HealthCare – Medical Group – Prompt Care in Godfrey collected food to donate a Thanksgiving meal to a family in need. They also started a micro food pantry for patients, which is stocked by their Mission Partners. Recently, they noticed a need for coats for pediatric patients, so they hung a rack and filled it with new and used coats for patients to take.

OSF Medical Group in Clinton donated an SUV-load of supplies to the Dove Project in Decatur, supporting domestic abuse survivors and neighborhood food programs for those in need.


In the urgent care setting, we are currently not using peak flow monitoring despite having the equipment. We see patients with asthma exacerbations who complain of shortness of breath and could benefit from the objective measurement. Carol Hermes created a poster outlining pertinent information about peak flow monitoring, which was developed and placed in an easily viewed space in the breakroom. Additionally, she sent an email to staff to raise awareness of this learning need. The goal is to provide staff with information on what peak flow monitoring is, who benefits from it and how to do it. The target audience is RNs, MOAs and radiology techs at PromptCares.

NURSE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

MINISTRYWIDE DEU INSTRUCTOR EDUCATION INITIATED IN 2024

The CNOs have approved a Ministrywide dedicated education unit (DEU) instructor education course, which is now available for Mission Partners to self-enroll in the OSF Corporate University.

This course is interactive and contains information that DEU instructors will find helpful to facilitate adult learning and communication in their DEU students.

By providing an asynchronous course, we have condensed and updated common information exchanged, as well as minimized the amount of time Mission Partners are away from clinical workflows to attend the Clinical Teaching Workshops.

Our academic partners are still conducting Clinical Teaching Workshops; however, the information is condensed and related to the specific semester's course content.

Full preparation of DEU instructors includes completion of Preceptor 1 & 2, the DEU Instructor course in OSF Corporate University and attendance at Clinical Teaching Workshops related to each semester.

Approved for 1.5 CEs, this course replaces the previous DEU course specific to OSF Medical Group and Home Care. If you have previously completed a DEU course in OSF Corporate University, you do not need to take this course, although you are not prohibited.

OSF HealthCare is accredited as a provider of nursing continuing professional development by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation.

We will place 62 DEU students in OSF Medical Group.



2024 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AVAILABLE FOR NURSES



In collaboration with academic partner Bradley University, OSF Medical Group – Pediatrics in Glen Park proudly hosted the Evidence-Based Practice Capstone Project of their DNP Nursing student, Sadie Lemman. This project successfully integrated the Buzzy Bee and a comprehensive, multi-disciplinary pain protocol into the workflows of both nursing and medical assistant teams.

Nurse Managed Anticoagulation Education Program

Goals:

- Create a **better understanding of high-risk nature of warfarin** and direct oral anticoagulants.
- **Improve confidence** in use of Nurse Managed Anticoagulation Protocols.
- **Support Mission Partners to retain knowledge** for years to come.

Format:

- **Enhanced Pre-Requisite Education on Anticoagulation Basics**
 - Completion required 30 days prior to in-seat course
 - Must pass post assessment with a 90% (Remediation education will be provided if score not achieved)
- **Implementation of required shadowing prior to in-seat session**
- **Enhanced in-seat session including study and scenario-based practice, calculation and protocol management practice, and AEMR demo/Sandbox practice.**
 - In-seat will require post assessment completion with a passing score of 90%. (Remediation education will be provided if score not achieved)
- **Assessment of retention**
 - Newly trained Mission Partners will receive a short 30- day and 90-day post assessment and confidence assessment after in-seat course attendance
- **Moving forward**
 - **All newly trained and currently trained** Mission Partners will receive **quarterly microlearning assignments** to stay up to date with evidence-based practice, remain competent, and stay confident in management of Anticoagulation patients!

KEY RESULTS



Well Child Visit times were significantly decreased compared to the previous year time frame (95 minutes vs 71 minutes)



Both Pain and Anxiety were reduced with the use of the poke plan



Staff data showed decreased manual force required and showed that 60% of the time the poke plan was being used compared to 0% prior




Outpatient setting has no standard of care for pain interventions (Lepa et al., 2021)



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OUTCOMES



EMPLOYEE/OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH CARING FOR THE CAREGIVERS

Our OSF Employee/Occupational Health clinics continually provide care for our Mission Partners and others who serve within OSF.
